Survey Outcome Update

I am updating you all about the outcomes of our Annual Parent Survey from last academic year but also the response to this from myself, the leadership team and the school's Governing Board. I will first explain the process, then outcomes and finally an update on the actions we have begun implementing from this.

The process involved in actioning the survey, as many of you will recall, is an online Survey Monkey questionnaire that broadly follows the format Ofsted use when they inspect schools. The survey ran last spring for 1 month. We sent out 566 surveys and had 130 responses, though it is impossible to know whether a family completed a survey for each child in their family, or separate parents or carers in a household made individual responses. However, if we work on the premise of a return per household, there are 306 households with our community this would suggest we had a return of about 44%. The survey outcomes and comments were then reviewed by the Children, Families and Communities Committee and finally the Full Governing Board of the school so we could discuss the areas for development going forward.

The results for the 'Three key questions' are shown in three columns showing trends over the last 6 years. The left-hand columns show positive responses to the questions over the last 6 year (either agree or strongly agree responses); the central columns (in blue) show neutral responses (neither agree nor disagree) and the right-hand columns (in light green) negative responses (disagree or strongly disagree).

Results

The 3 key questions show an overall decrease in parental response satisfaction.

In the 'neutral' answer count increased in 2 and decreased in 1 (i.e. the number of questions answered 'neither agree nor disagree').

In the 'positive' answer count there were drops in each question and similarly there were rises in each of the 'negative' answer count.

Results

Obviously, these outcomes are a disappointing outcome for the leadership team, wider staff body and myself as Headteacher for which I take responsibility. Hence, we have shared these with the relevant sections of the schools Governing body and whilst an array of internal and external school review data would challenge particular outcomes of the survey data it would be wrong not to take the responses seriously and so we have been working hard this term on an array of actions to ensure the next Annual Parents Survey has a more positive outcome. Our work will continue across the year to include work on other topics raised in the survey including inclusion and behaviour in addition to improving communication.

Actions in response to the Annual Parent Survey

- ◆ You said the newsletter wasn't clear enough and hard to read. We have changed format and style and are continuing to review.
- ◆ You wanted clearer and more concise information about calendar dates for the school. We have reformatted these and are now issuing these in advance of each term start.
- ◆ You wanted us to provide clearer processes around complaints that don't meet the threshold of a formal grievance. We are producing a flowchart to show who to direct your questions to, where to find information and what our response process will be and within what timescale.
- ◆ You wanted more contact with class teachers at drop off and pick up. Teachers in Year 1 and Year 2 are now downstairs on the patio on 2 mornings a week as well as other staff members.
- ◆ You wanted more clarity and a revamp of the website. We are partially through this process and we are hopeful of a full review by the end of the first half of the spring term.
- ◆ You wanted more presence from the leadership team on the gate. Annabel or I are now on the gate each morning and I am predominantly not class based.
- ◆ You wanted us to review our communications channels and set out a clear procedure/process for how teachers communicate and when and where parents can get information about the school year and events. We have refined this in the newsletter and at the start of each term are also adding these to the school website calendar.
- ◆ We will before next year Annual Parents Survey carry out a smaller scale sample of parents to see whether our actioned improvements are having the impact we hope for and complete the other actions by the Spring half term.



Should I keep my child off school?

Yes

Until...

Chickenpox	at least 5 days from the onset of the rash and until all blisters have crusted over
Diarrhoea and Vomiting	48 hours after their last episode
Cold and Flu-like illness (including COVID-19)	they no longer have a high temperature and feel well enough to attend. Follow the national guidance if they've tested positive for COVID-19.
Impetigo	their sores have crusted and healed, or 48 hours after they started antibiotics
Measles	4 days after the rash first appeared
Mumps	5 days after the swelling started
Scabies	they've had their first treatment
Scarlet Fever	24 hours after they started taking antibiotics
Whooping Cough	48 hours after they started taking antibiotics

Attendance Mentor Program

The pilot programme will run for 18 months, with each pupil receiving up to eight weeks of intensive support.

What will the Attendance Mentors do?

Mentors will work directly with pupils to identify the root causes of absence at the earliest opportunity, ensuring tailored support can be provided to maximise impact.

This includes:

1. **Building trusted relationships with pupils** through one-to-one sessions.
2. **Identifying and addressing the underlying reasons for declining attendance**, which may include personal, social, emotional, or practical challenges affecting the pupil's ability to attend school regularly.
3. **Providing practical support**, including help with routines, strategies to rebuild confidence in attending school, practical support tailored to each pupil's needs and, if appropriate, referrals to other services.
4. **Acting as a bridge between home and school**, liaising with staff and families to ensure a joined-up approach.
5. **Monitoring progress and adapting support plans** as needed, with a focus on sustainable improvement.

This requires parental consent so if you are contacted by Seline, our School Home Support (SHS) practitioner or me then you will have this information about the program in advance.



The NHS provides clear [guidance](#) on when children are well enough to attend school. Most mild illnesses — such as a runny nose, sore throat, or slight cough — do **not** require time off school, unless a child has a temperature.

Vaccinations are a key line of defence against flu and other preventable illnesses. When children and young people receive all the recommended vaccines in the national immunisation programme, it helps protect their health and support the wellbeing of the whole school community.




